Welcome to our EMTAS summer term newsletter – it's been both a busy and eventful term!



### **Liverpool - A Tapestry of Language**

Supporting our children for whom English is an Additional Language is a key aspect of our work at EMTAS.

During the last term, the team has supported children from across the world including those children whose families have been forced to flee their homes – including Afghanistan, Ukraine and Hong Kong.

During this term our staff have supported over 170 newly arrived primary pupils - speaking in excess of 20 languages across 16 of our primary schools.




### **Celebrating Diversity**

During summer term, one of the team delivered 'Rainbow Smiles' - a programme focusing on celebrating difference and similarity.

Over 360 pupils across 4 schools took part.

Further workshops have been delivered to 60 pupils exploring local Black history and 'Race and Diversity'.

A further 25 pupils learnt about the significance of the hijab.



## Summer Term Support: a snapshot

We've worked with 23 EAL parents and carers – all of whom have benefitted from the 'English Language for Families' programme.

This is a course to both support language acquisition and to support parents in understanding our education system here in the UK.

In addition, a further 20 parents have benefitted from informal discussion about language acquisition processes.

By offering a wide-ranging training programme for teachers and support staff - our overarching aim is to empower mainstream practitioners to have the skills needed to support a culturally and linguistically diverse school community. Over 200 practitioners have attended school based and centrally delivered training sessions.

We have provided wide-ranging support for some of our most vulnerable families and pupils – including Irish Travellers by supporting with admissions, in year transfers and EHCPs.

We've worked alongside colleagues from health and social care - acting as that bridge to engagement and inclusion.

EMTAS has also welcomed Governors from over 20 schools to a session exploring EAL best practice.

The session also allowed governors to reflect on Equality and Diversity.


# The EMTAS shorts!
